1	a big deal	very important	The boss always makes a <u>big deal</u> about our projected sales.
2	to be up on (something)	to know the latest information about something (a certain subject).	Brian is up on the <u>latest</u> technology.
3	deadline	due date, when something needs to be finished	Friday is the <u>deadline</u> for turning in proposals to the marketing department.
4	bazillion	infinite number (number that keeps going)	I have a <u>bazillion</u> things to do this week.
5	get (it)	understand	I don't <u>get it</u> . Why are we changing computer systems again?
6	uptight	nervous, anxious	The new girl is so <u>uptight</u> . She needs to relax a little or she will never make any sales.
7	corporate	main office or headquarters	We are waiting for <u>corporate</u> to approve the budget.
8	yes man	someone who always agrees with the boss or supervisor	Marco is such a <u>yes man</u> .
